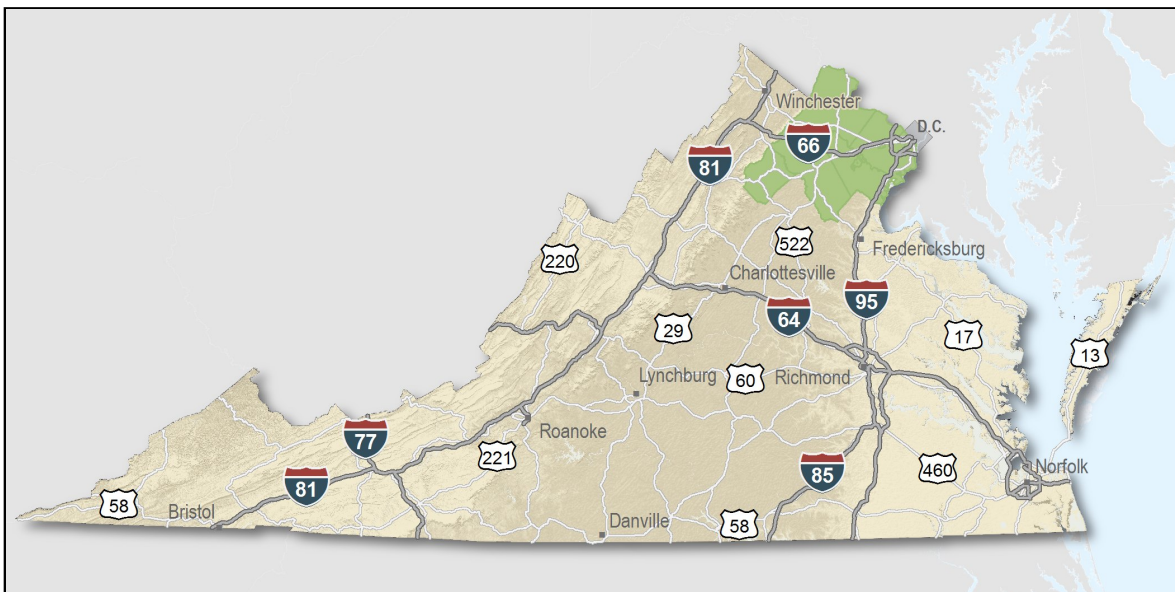

Northern Virginia

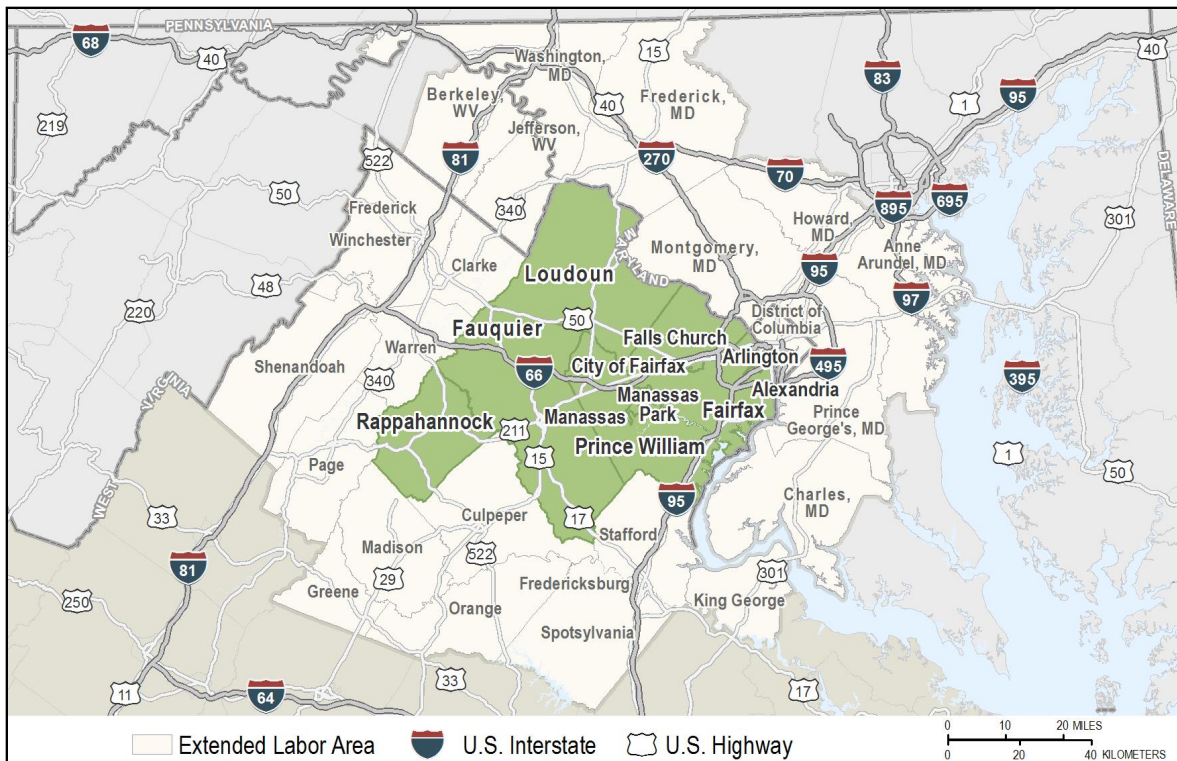


Location

Northern Virginia is located in the northeastern corner of Virginia, just west of the Potomac River and Washington, D.C. Consisting of 2,256 square miles, Northern Virginia is the most densely populated region in Virginia.

The area is known as a major center for U.S. and foreign corporate headquarters, technical and professional service firms, and trade and professional organizations. A highly skilled and educated labor force, coupled with a well-integrated transportation network, including access to three major airports, helps position the region for continued business expansion.

The city of Fairfax is 106 miles north of Richmond, the state capital; 192 miles north of Norfolk; and 49 miles southwest of Baltimore.



Northern Virginia

The densely populated Northern Virginia Region is home to the federal government; more than 100 U.S. and global corporate headquarters, including 10 Fortune 500 companies; technical and service firms; trade and professional organizations; and strong industry clusters in government contracting, defense electronics, IT, data centers, biotechnology and bioinformatics. Recognized as the nation's Cyber Capital, Northern Virginia has the highest concentration of bandwidth worldwide and has emerged as the hub of cutting-edge intelligence technology, fertile ground for the cybersecurity industry. Residents benefit from more than 60 higher education institutions offering a wide range of undergraduate and graduate degree programs. A highly skilled and educated talent pool of over four million, combined with a robust transportation infrastructure, including access to three major international airports, make Northern Virginia one of the most sought-after business destinations in the world.

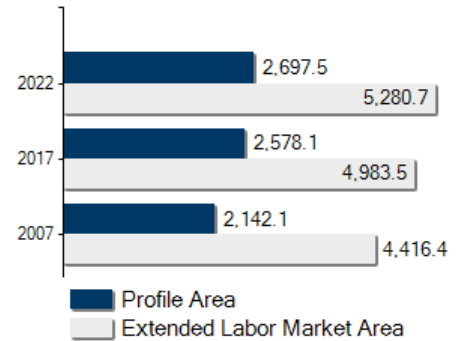


Washington Dulles International Airport

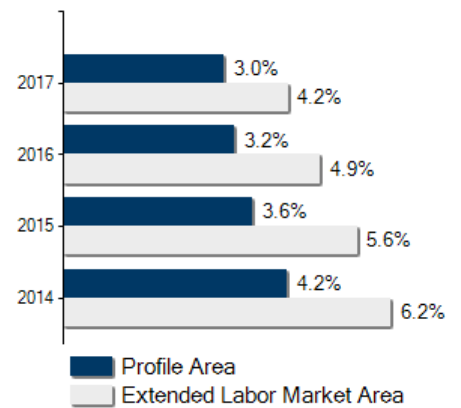

Government and Taxes

Government

Northern Virginia includes Arlington, Fairfax, Fauquier, Loudoun, Prince William, and Rappahannock Counties and the cities of Alexandria, Fairfax, Falls Church, Manassas, and Manassas Park.

All counties have a board of supervisors and a county administrator or county executive. Each city has a city council and city manager.

All localities have comprehensive plans and subdivision and zoning ordinances.

There are 18 incorporated towns in Northern Virginia.

Taxes

Localities in Virginia collect a 1% sales tax. They do not tax other items taxed at the State level.

Counties and cities in Virginia are separate taxing entities. Therefore, a company pays taxes to either a county or to a city.

If a company is located in a town, it pays town and county taxes except for utility taxes which are paid only to the town and the license tax which is paid only to the town unless town law permits the additional collection of a county tax.

Manufacturers pay real estate, machinery and tools, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes.

Nonmanufacturers pay real estate, tangible personal property, truck and automobile, utility, and sales taxes. They also may pay either a merchants' capital or a license tax.



Community Facilities

Northern Virginia residents have access to outstanding health care throughout the region. Inova Fairfax Hospital located in Falls Church is the heart of the region's hospital system. This 833-bed facility is a regional referral center housing Northern Virginia's only Level 1 trauma center, and it is one of a few hospitals in the nation that offers a full range of organ transplantation. It is located on the same campus as Inova Fairfax Hospital for Children and the Inova Heart and Vascular Institute. U.S. News & World Report ranked Inova Fairfax hospital among the nation's best in the following specialties: heart and heart surgery, gynecology, digestive disorders, and endocrinology. Three other hospitals are located in Fairfax County. Additional facilities are located in Alexandria, Arlington County, Fauquier County, Manassas, Prince William County, and Loudoun County. Inova Alexandria Hospital and the Virginia Hospital Center in Arlington are two of the largest health care providers in Northern Virginia both with more than 300 beds.

More than 5,000 physicians and 1,500 dentists practice in Northern Virginia.

Thirty-two nursing and retirement homes are located throughout the Northern Virginia area with over 4,000 nursing home beds authorized.

More than 1,300 places of worship are located in Northern Virginia.

The region has eight public library systems with 53 branches containing approximately 4.5 million volumes. Reciprocal arrangements exist with the public library systems in the Washington metropolitan area. In addition, the libraries of several area colleges and universities are publicly available. George Mason University alone has a collection of 1.3 million volumes of print media, 87,000 electronic media, 37,000 journals, and 516 databases available from five facilities.

The Northern Virginia/Washington D.C. area represents one of the largest retail concentrations on the East Coast. In Northern Virginia alone nine major regional malls offer a variety of shopping and dining opportunities at more than 1,400 establishments. Five of those malls are located in Fairfax County. They include Tysons Corner Center, the largest in the region, and Tysons Galleria, both well-known for the upscale national department stores that serve as anchors. Potomac Mills, located in Prince William County, is one of the nation's largest malls and Virginia's number one tourist attraction. It contains nearly 250 stores and offers outlet prices on thousands of name brands. Arlington County is home to a variety of major shopping facilities including Pentagon City Fashion Centre, an 860,000 square foot shopping mall featuring 3 stories and 170 stores and restaurants. There are numerous unique shopping opportunities outside the malls. The historic Old Town District in Alexandria, near the Potomac River, is a bustling center of retail and service activity in a district known for Colonial-era architecture and cobblestone streets. Tackett's Mill Specialty Center has nearly 50 shops in a beautiful New England style setting complete with a working 18th century gristmill. The Northern Virginia retail assortment ranges from high fashion, full-line department stores to discount stores.



Lifestyle

Area residents enjoy fine cultural offerings in Northern Virginia and nearby Washington D.C. America's only national park for the performing arts, Wolf Trap Farm National Park for the Performing Arts, is located in Fairfax County and offers a full range of musical entertainment including jazz, folk, opera, and musical theater, as well as educational programs offered both locally and nationally. The Fairfax Symphony, housed in the Center for The Arts at George Mason University, stages a complete schedule of concerts and conducts an extensive series of outreach programs in area schools. The American Youth Philharmonic Orchestras include two training orchestras and two symphonic orchestras. The Philharmonic Orchestra has become known as one of the nation's finest youth orchestras having represented Virginia youth in the arts through performances worldwide. The Arlington Arts Center is a focal point for art exhibitions, plays and recitals and is one of the largest venues for emerging and contemporary artists in the Northern Virginia/Washington D.C area. The Little Theater of Alexandria stages several major productions each year, ranging from musicals to classical and experimental theater, and it is the oldest award-winning theater in the Washington metropolitan area. There are many other community musical organizations available in the region. Across the Potomac River in Washington D.C., residents and tourists can take advantage of an unparalleled selection of activities. Such venues include The Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts; National Symphony Orchestra; Warner and Ford's Theatres; the Corcoran Gallery; National Gallery of Art; and the Smithsonian Institution, the worlds' largest museum complex, and the National Zoo.

History buffs will find many historic homes and sites in the area. George Washington's home, Mount Vernon, is America's most visited historic estate and is located in Fairfax City. The Manassas Battlefield Park is located in the southern part of the region. The battlefield was the site of two strategic battles of the Civil War and attracts thousands of visitors each year. Other historic landmarks include George Mason's Gunston Hall, Arlington National Cemetery, Woodlawn Plantation., and the Vietnam Veteran's Memorial. The National Museum of the Marine Corps located in Prince William County is a lasting tribute to U.S. Marines featuring exhibits using innovative technology.

National, state, regional, and local parks are located throughout the region. The National Park Service operates Great Falls Park in Fairfax County and Prince William Forest Park. Great Falls Park along the Potomac River is a unique recreational and historic resource, as it is the site of America's first canal system. The 15,000-acre Prince William Forest Park provides 37 miles of year-round hiking trails, camping, picnicking, and 21 miles of bike-accessible roads. The Northern Virginia Regional Park Authority operates 21 park facilities in Northern Virginia on more than 10,000 acres of rolling and wooded countryside and streams. These facilities include hiking trails, boating, fishing, swimming, picnic areas and golf courses. County and town parks also provide numerous ball fields, playgrounds, tennis courts and picnic sites.

Water and outdoor sportsmen will find Northern Virginia attractive. There are 42 private and 36 public golf courses in Northern Virginia. Sixty-one are 18-hole courses and 17 are 9-hole courses. Public and private marinas are located along the Potomac and Occoquan River shorelines. Numerous lakes and rivers boast an abundance of freshwater fish. Hunting for deer, wild turkey, and other small game is enjoyed in season.

Professional sports are popular in the area. Prince William County is home to professional baseball. The Potomac Nationals, Class A farm team of the Washington Nationals, play at the G. Richard Pfitzner Stadium. The Washington Redskins, Baltimore Ravens, Washington Wizards, Baltimore Orioles, Washington Nationals, Washington Capitals, and D.C. United represent the Metropolitan area in football, basketball, baseball, hockey, and soccer. Professional golf and tennis tournaments are also scheduled in the region. Collegiate basketball at George Mason University and nearby Georgetown University is also popular.

Local festivals add flavor to the regional lifestyle. The Alexandria Red Cross Waterfront Festival, an annual June event, celebrates the city's importance as a seaport. The Virginia Scottish Games in Fauquier County celebrates Virginia's Scottish heritage. The green hills and open countryside of Loudoun County provide an excellent setting for numerous equestrian events.
